
First semester exam Paper valuation was started on 21st of October for the first batch Pre-University students and it is on the process.

News from DMI-St. Joseph College of Management and Technology – Sierra Leone

On 10th October, College was re-opened for the new academic year 2011-12. 43 new students have joined for the first year most of them hailing from Freetown and Makeni. This augurs well for the College, because the impact of the College has begun to be felt increasingly around the Capital of this country.

We invited Mr.Joseph Turay, Director, Caritas Makeni, to address our students. He gave an impassioned appeal to the new entrants to make the best use of the privilege of studying in this special institution which sets a high value for quality education. He even extended a cordial welcome to the students of IT and Commerce, the Information Technology as interns in his reputed Organization.



We organized Orientation Programmes for the staff and students both first and second year on different days. The total no of students is currently 79.

The Second year and first year students had a heartily-fought out, friendly football match and the second year students won the match with a dramatic score of 4 - 1. The newly-built Hostels have come alive with more and more students opting to stay there. Currently, we have 22 girls and 25 boys living in the hostel.



In the night this campus, so secluded and far-removed from the nearby town, assumes a special academic look, with students poring over books, brightly illumined and sparklingly brilliant, fringed by the dark green wild surroundings, when the power supply is on.

We completed building a new Canteen for students adjoining the main academic blocks. It stands ready to cater to all the local needs of food for the students.

Another glimmer of hope for development of this region has come about with the cables getting drawn over electric posts planted about four months ago. The advent of electricity would mark a sea-change in the entire personal and academic life of the whole population of our campus. Perhaps even the days of Internet connectivity are not all that far beyond the horizon.

Thanks to the high-speed work carried out by giant earth-moving machines of the African minerals, there has been a day-to-day improvement in the condition of the Main Access Road to our College from Makeni.

For the present, the Boys' Hostel is taken care by the management of Fatima Campus (UNIMAK) since the beginning of the new academic year.

Maslow's theory maintains that a person does not feel a higher need until the needs of the current level have been satisfied. The hierarchy is dynamic; the dominant need is always shifting.

Physiological needs-also known as biological needs; consists of oxygen, food, water, constant body temperature. Physiological are the strongest needs.

Safety Needs-Security and Protection from physical and emotional harm. Adults have little awareness for safety needs except in times of emergency.


Belongingness & Love needs- people seek to overcome feelings of loneliness and alienation. It involves giving and receiving love, affection and a sense of belonging.

Needs for Esteem-involves both self-esteem and esteem a person gets from others. Humans need for self-respect and respect of others are vital. When these needs are satisfied person feels self-confident and valuable. When these needs are not met people feel inferior, weak, helpless, and worthless.

Aesthetic Needs: - Cognitive – to know, to understand, to explore. Aesthetic-to find symmetry (equilibrium), order and beauty.

Self actualization characteristics Problem focused and solved, Incorporate an ongoing freshness of appreciation of life, concerned about personal growth, ability to have peak experiences and utilizing the full potentials for other's well being.

Transcendence – to help others, find self-fulfillment and realize their potential and reaching the ultimate goal in life.



We are motivated to be authentic, to become world class citizens, to discover the purpose of our life. To realize that life is precious, there is joy in life, to accept the person and help them find their inner self, to see that basic needs are satisfied, to refresh the consciousness, to understand that controls are good, complete abandon is bad, to transcend the trifling problems and tackle the serious problems of life, to make good choices and to live a meaningful life.
